A few short weeks later, the first Ava Lee novel was completed.

Ian is not a stranger to the literary world. He began his career as a journalist and wrote a non-fiction book in 1968, The Children's Crusade, which was a Canadian Book-of-the-Month selection. He has written for several magazines and newspapers in Canada and the U.S., including Maclean's, Boston Magazine, Saturday Night, the Regina Leader-Post, the Calgary Albertan, and the Calgary Herald. He has been a senior executive with the federal government, and as worked internationally as a diplomat and businessman. Although there are 40 years between books, Ian never lost his passion for writing.

Letter from the President

A recent New York Times Book Review had an interesting write-up on author Elmore Leonard. In addition to profiling his new book, Raylan, the article included some of Leonard's rather piquant writing tips. I thought you might find them interesting and perhaps even helpful.

"Easy on the adverbs, exclamation points and especially hooptedoodle." Adverbs and exclamation points are valid, but always in moderation. I'm not sure what 'hooptedoodle is, though.

"If it sounds like writing, I rewrite it." Sounds to me like a good rule, one that applies to any type of writing. I know that if I write a business document that 'sounds like writing', something's wrong. The idea is to communicate, and we do that best when we don't force things.

"If proper usage gets in the way, it may have to go." I always try to remind myself that the rules of writing came later. Communication – getting the point across – is the reason we write, and if the rules aren't helping us get there, then we must find another way. Just ask Shakespeare (and a host of others).

I've not read any of Leonard's work, but if his rules are any indication of the tenor of his work, he's definitely going on my 'must read' list.

One the home front, Maurus Cappa has stepped up to become our new Webmaster, with a special focus on our website Members area. New developments include a blog, a chat area, member profiles, and more. 

How to List Your Book on Amazon


With great difficulty, and much back and forth with the "Help", Isobel Raven has succeeded in listing A Flower for Allie (AFFA) on Amazon and adding the Search Inside The Book (SITB) feature. She has written some tips for other authors who also plan to list their books on Amazon.

Listing the book:

- 1. Go to Amazon.ca. (Canadians can't list on Amazon.com.)
- 2. Set up a Seller Account. You have to set up Pro Selling in order to list a book that isn't already in their catalogue. You can downgrade to Individual Seller later. That costs about \$30.00.
- 3. Design the page describing your book. Take your time. Be accurate. It's hard to fix if you have a typo. "The photo download didn't work for me. I got my cover photo on by working from the page for AFFA that buyers see." Buyers are allowed to enter comments and photos.

Getting SITB:

- 1. You have to deal with Amazon.com for this. Set up a Seller Account for SITB with them. You can start at the blurb for SITB located under the cover photo of your book on your Amazon.ca listing. You cannot use your Amazon.ca Seller Account for this. You set up a new account with a different password.
- 2. You will receive an e-mail invitation to enter SITB. Use the link provided to receive another e-mail containing a Code Number.
- 3. Using the link provided, send your Code number to Amazon.com.
- 4. You will receive another e-mail inviting you to Amazon.com Seller Central and giving you the link. There you can easily find the place to upload you text and cover .pdf's.
- 5. SITB is fairly clear about the kind and size of files you may send. Have them on file in the required form for uploading. (SITB is free.)
